## **Delaware Electric Co-op Crews Respond Quickly to Tornado Damage**

A suspected **tornado** struck **Delaware Electric Cooperative's service territory** on the morning of **Monday, April 15**. The storm knocked out power to 6,000 co-op members and left debris scattered for several miles across Sussex County.



An April 15 tornado passed through Delaware, uprooting trees and spreading damage across DEC's service area.

The worst of the damage was focused in the Seaford area along Route 20 and Baker Mill Road. The storm **ripped the second floor from a home** and **destroyed numerous barns and outbuildings**. An Utz distribution center and chicken houses were also heavily damaged.

The **National Weather Service** issued a **tornado warning** for Sussex County around 3:30 a.m., with the first outages reported around 3:45 a.m. The tornado was initially

categorized as an EF-1 with an estimated wind speed of 95 mph.

**Co-op crews worked all day** to restore power to members. Linemen had to replace broken poles, cross arms and spans of line damaged by the severe weather. Officials reported one injury as a result of the storm.

According to DEC President and CEO **Bill Andrew**, "It has been years since the state has seen storm damage this severe. We appreciated the words of encouragement from members as our crews worked hard to turn the lights back

on and we are hopeful our members impacted by the storm are able to quickly rebuild."

Tornados seem to be occurring **more frequently** in Delaware. **In 2017**, a tornado **damaged**

**DEC's headquarters** in Greenwood and a stronger tornado **ripped through DEC's service territory** in Kent County **in 2014**, injuring several members.

# Mecklenburg Line Worker Is 1<sup>st</sup> to Earn Degree through Partnership Agreement

There's a new graduate working the lines.

Mitch DeJarnette, a line technician with Mecklenburg Electric Cooperative, is the first student to earn an associate degree as part of a novel partnership between Southside Virginia Community College and the VMD Association.

The program enables apprentice linemen to pursue a degree as an **Industrial Maintenance Technician** while they're **continuing to work** to keep the lights on. It was a perfect fit for Mitch, who's been **at Mecklenburg for two years** following **four years with Central Virginia Electric Cooperative**.

"I feel a degree offers me more value and more opportunities," Mitch said. "And, I was like the guinea pig being the first in the program, too."

"This partnership is yet another example of the Commonwealth's electric cooperatives joining forces with the community colleges to provide educational opportunities for those in our industry, or those looking to get started in the electric utility business," said **John C. Lee Jr.**, president and CEO of Mecklenburg Electric Cooperative.

"We encourage our employees to continue their professional growth and we are proud of Mitch for taking advantage of the opportunity to glean even greater value from his lineman training, and position himself to be

considered for other professional development options," John added.

As part of the program, apprentice linemen at co-ops in Virginia can receive **up to 35 hours of college credit** for on-thejob training. The SVCC program enables them to take **online classes to complete requirements** for an associate degree. That's a big plus — the classroom setting at SVCC's campuses in Keysville or Alberta **would have put Mitch too far** from his on-call responsibilities.

He also noted that his professors understood when his job pressed up against his assignments. "All I had to do was explain the situation to them; the key is communication."

Richard Johnstone, president and CEO of the VMD Association, praised Mitch's determination and said he hopes it sets an example for other young linemen.

"Helping students meet their educational goals is core to our mission. We hope this partnership will encourage all of the graduates of our program to enroll and also those from other programs as well," Richard said. "Creating this career pathway will allow students to progress from industry-recognized credentials to an associate degree and hopefully on to a bachelor's degree."

## Acclaimed Line Work Expert Don Harbuck to Be Keynote Speaker at Awards Banquet

The audience at the **awards banquet** following the **Gaff-n-Go Lineman's Rodeo** next month is in for **a treat**, and we don't mean dessert.

Don Harbuck, senior vice president for customer success at Northwest Lineman College (NLC), will be the featured speaker at the May 11 ceremony at the Hilton Hotel and Spa in Glen Allen, a short drive from the rodeo setup in Doswell, Virginia.

Don has **more than 50 years of experience** in the utility industry at investorowneds and cooperatives. A fierce **advocate for safety** in the trade, he's been honored numerous times by his peers with service awards and leadership positions in national associations.

The South Carolina resident said his presentation will focus on the **history**, **tradition and development of the American lineman** based on a book by NLC colleague Alan Drew.

"I will chronologically go through the history of the American lineman, where it started back in the telegraph system days in the 1800s and bring it up to the modern day, where solar, wind and those types of things are taking over the scene," he said.

That history tour will contain important lessons for today's crews, Don added. Foremost among them: **Never stop** learning.

"You want to look at what you can do and what you can learn that will help you be better tomorrow than you were today," he said.

Don has been at NLC, the industry-leading educational institute, since 2012, following his time as director of loss control and training at **The Electric Cooperatives of South Carolina**. He's a graduate of **Georgia Regents University** and has been married to his **high school sweetheart Frankie** for 49 years. They have two children.

"Don is tremendously respected within the industry for his commitment to making lineworkers become the best that they can be," said **Brian Mosier**, chief operating officer of the VMD Association. "We're looking forward to hearing his insights."

Doors open at 5 p.m. with the banquet starting at 5:30 p.m. Don is scheduled to speak at 6:45 p.m. The awards presentations begin at 7:45 p.m.

### Final Plans Underway for May 22 Dedication Ceremony

The **lineman statue is in place** and final preparations are underway as the VMD Association nears the **formal launch** of the **Electric Cooperative Training Center** on **May 22 in Palmyra**.

The 9,600-square-foot building has hosted several meetings and classes in recent weeks as a "soft opening" toward the big day, when **dignitaries**, **co-op leaders** and **Fluvanna County representatives** will officially dedicate the new facility.

"The initial feedback we've received from class attendees and visitors has been very positive," said **Richard G. Johnstone Jr.**, president and CEO of the Association. "This project takes our training capabilities to another level and we think it'll be a boost for Fluvanna County, as well."

The building is located on Salem Church Road, across from **Central Virginia Electric Cooperative's Palmyra office**, about five miles south of exit 136 on Interstate 64. CVEC provided nine acres for the **\$1.5 million endeavor**.

It represents the culmination of planning since the Association started holding training classes in a triple-wide modular unit on the site in 2013. Training for linemen, system operators and substation operators initially involved **just 14 weeks a year**. Now it runs to **42 weeks annually**, underscoring the need for a larger, permanent structure.

The building has **three classrooms** — one each named for **Maryland**, **Virginia** and **Delaware**. The rooms employ **state-of-the-art video technology** with a touchpad system to **control lighting** and **A/V equipment**. The building also offers a full-service kitchen with a catering window, a break room, and showers in the men's and women's restrooms. There's parking for **up to 62 vehicles**, with plenty of room for the overflow expected at the launch day.

When guests arrive on May 22, they'll encounter the **"Storm Soldier"** statue, a bronze sculpture created by **Arkansas sculptor Ron Moore**. It's located just right of the main entrance. **A mural** from the Association's former training center in Culpeper has been given a facelift and is mounted along the center hallway, **linking the old and new** training facilities. A **color-coded map** designating the member systems in the Association will be installed soon.

Even if the building exceeds training space expectations, that's no problem. The south side of the building structure has an **expandable end wall** for possible expansion.

Given the center's proximity to the CVEC office and its short, 45-minute trip from Association headquarters, Richard said it also could serve as **an outage center** or **base camp** during major weather-related activities.

"The possibilities with a modern facility such as this are limitless," he said. "We want to thank all the members of the Association who have worked so hard to realize this accomplishment. For many years into the future, this training center will benefit our member systems, our linemen and system personnel, and ultimately all of our co-op member-owners."

#### **Gubernatorial Proclamation**

## Virginia Recognizes Line Workers on May 11

The men and women **who keep the lights on** in Virginia will come in for **special recognition on May 11**. **Gov. Ralph Northam** has proclaimed the day **"Electric Utility Line Workers Day"** in the Commonwealth.

The day coincides with the second day of the annual Gaff-n-Go Lineman's Rodeo in Doswell.

Northam's proclamation cites the long history of **responsible and reliable service** that electric utilities have provided since the early days of electrification.

It specifically calls out the contributions of rural electric cooperatives as **"electricity made its way into the farms, homes, towns, and villages of rural America and the Commonwealth."** Central to that accomplishment was the labor of line workers, the proclamation adds.

"Electric utility line workers consistently and valiantly serve Virginians by providing reliable, affordable electricity, and do so by installing electric service, repairing damage after storms, providing for their own continuing education and training, and maintaining the highest standards of safety and professionalism, often putting themselves in harm's way in order to restore power after outages caused by inclement weather or a natural disaster," according to the document.

"I call this observance to the attention of all our citizens," Gov. Northam added.
